**THE FACE OF AFRICA**

Alek Wek is a model and a handbag designer. She has been called “the face of Africa”. She comes from a family of nine children. “I’m the seventh of nine children. It makes you understand it’s not all about you.”

She escaped from the Sudanese War in 1991 at the age of 14. “It went from this small town where we used to have fun to a danger zone... and that’s when the police told everybody in town to leave because they couldn’t protect us.”

She arrived at Heathrow Airport in London with just one flimsy dress. “It was so cold, so unfriendly, and so scary, but at least there was no gunfire!”

She used to work cleaning toilets. “I had jobs from the age of 14 when I arrived in London as a refugee. Aged 17, I’d get up at 4 am to work as a cleaner before school. It wasn’t pleasant.”

Her big break came when she was shopping with friends at a market. A scout from a modelling agency asked her to be a model when she was 18. “I never imagined that somebody would ever look at me and think I’m beautiful.”

She doesn’t take her job too seriously. “There’s no such thing as a perfect model. It all comes down to whether you’re right for a particular job.”

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
